Session Description: The future of transportation includes automated and later autonomous vehicles. The automated vehicles are being equipped with sensing systems that replace the human eye and algorithms that replace the cognitive functions that allow us to drive. The sensing technology that is being used in automated vehicles might include LiDAR, machine vision systems and communication systems and the needs of these systems in terms of lighting are very different than the human eye. So, as we move from legacy vehicles to more and more automation, what are the implications for the lighting of roadways? This means that the lighting of roads in the future must accommodate the needs of these systems. This session is a discussion of the current status of automated and autonomous vehicles, a discussion of the technology being used in these vehicles, a discussion of the times when these systems fail and a projection of how lighting might be changed in the future.

<u>Session Description</u>: LED emitter choices in currently available variable color-mixing LED fixtures vary significantly. This course demonstrates how these emitter choices have a noticeable effect on color range and color quality of LED fixture light output.

The course is a demonstration of how lighting is changing with the advent of multi-color LED-powered fixtures. The wonderfully variable but sometimes non-intuitive color capabilities of LED-powered lighting gives designers the power to both radically and subtly manipulate color in a real-time basis. This session presents some of the basic science behind color perception and the nuances of additive color mixing. It shows how differences in emitter color choices can affect the color quality of fixture output. The course introduces the concept of metamerism as it applies to mixing color with light and presents some ideas for the intuitive control of color mixing fixtures.
